


DANGEROUS SNAKES OF THE WESTERN CAPE


Southern Africa has in the region of 170 different types of snakes. Although more than half of them are technically venomous, only 14 species are considered potentially deadly.









1 Keep the victim calm, immobilized and

In the event of a snake bite

transport the victim to the closest hospital.

2 If the victim stops breathing, resort to artificial respiration or make use of a Bag Valve Mask.

3 Call the Poison Information Centre helpline for further advice: +27 21 9316129.

DO NO

... cut and suck the wound. ... use ice or very hot water. ... give the victim alcohol.

... apply electric shock.

... inject antivenom randomly.

Antivenom (if required) must be administered by a doctor in a hospital environment.
